# Hometown hero wins Fair Lanes Open

Danny Wiseman thrilled his ardent local supporters who had turned out en masse to witness his first PBA victory in the \$150,000 Fair Lanes Open at Fair Lanes Woodlawn in March. Baltimore's Wiseman topped Don Moser, San Jose, Calif., 255-201, to earn \$28,000 and an invitation to this month's Firestone Tournament of Champions.

Wiseman, a four-year pro completing his first full-time year on the Tour, began his first championship round appearance with six consecutive strikes. He led by 54 pins after six frames before sparing, and a late triple by Moser merely closed the gap while Wiseman cruised home.

"This is the greatest, accomplishing this feat before the hometown crowd," Wiseman said. "I was just trying to take it one shot at a time. All I've worked toward is winning my first title. I feel I can win every time I enter—it's not just going to stop this week."

Moser improved one spot from his PBA best finish and his only other championship round appearance, when he placed third at last year's Fair Lanes Open.

"I wish every stop was held at a Fair Lanes center," Moser said. "I bowl well here (Woodlawn) every year and at Phoenix (hosted by Fair Lanes Squaw Peak on the Spring/Summer Tour), plus I finished second at the 1988 Fair Lanes National Resident Pro Championship."

Among the audience members on hand for the 21st annual Fair Lanes Open was American League Manager of the Year, Frank Robinson of the Baltimore Orioles, who offered his congratulations to the hometown champion and his wife, Lisa.

The ABC Sports-televised finals began with 13-time PBA champion Pete Weber topping Tony Westlake, Edmond, Okla., 209-182, and then Weber ousted Robert Lawrence, Austin, Texas, 247-211.

Lawrence was seeking his place in the PBA record books in becoming the only player to win his first two titles back-to-back.

Weber, Florissant, Mo., appeared unstoppable, but Moser was equal to his challenge and emerged in the semifinal, 255-234. Moser picked up \$14,500 as runner-up and hopes his habit of improving one position annually continues in Fair Lanes Opens.

Record crowds were on hand week-long and contributed their enthusiasm, but the new champ claimed he was oblivious to the vocal supporters.

"I rarely heard the crowd during the tournament—I was in my own zone," Wiseman said. "I didn't care who my opponent was for the title game—the pins are my only enemy."
