The area's best bowlers

In past articles, letters to the editor, etc., I have stated there are roughly only 20 true players in this association. This month I will recognize those players and other top NCABA bowlers.

A "player" is a scratch bowler who participates in scratch tournaments, has some degree of talent, some degree of skill development, and is also willing to increase his/her skill development. Merely averaging 200-plus in a league and *not* participating in scratch tournaments indicates only "good bowler" status.

A player bowls on different conditions at several centers, puts the money up, and competes against his/her peers on a scratch level. I hope there is no confusion between good bowler and player.

The rankings and listings are subjective. My apologies to those whom I inadvertently missed or overlooked.

The top 50 players (plus one) as I see it:

- 1. Rich Wolfe Is there any doubt?
- 2. David Reed When he is lined up and has a positive ball reaction, he is really tough to beat. First-rate cash record. The greatest pure talent ever to come from this association. If he ever learns how to bowl and becomes a skilled player, he will become a national star.
- 3. Jim Lewis Over the past six years, who has performed any better?
- **4. Tony Chapman** The national amateur champion. Always cashes. Very bright future.
- **5. Tony Walton** Star on the rise. Two recent PBA regional titles indicate a solid future. Needs to "cross the bridge" more often to gain greater respect among his Virginia peers.
- 6. Brian Poole Gets through the shot really well. As a "player," he should get more respect than he does. Solid cash record.
- 7. Ron Holt NCABA's best-kept secret. Excellent cash record. Future Hall of Famer. Needs to "cross the bridge" more often.
- 8. Hollis McMullen Not pretty, not powerful. He just knocks over the pins for the \$\$\$. Any doubts? Wager with him.
- 9. Lee Brosius A "hooker" he's not. A "player" he is.
- **10. Richard Dodge** Hall of Famer who always seems to be cashing. Has *great* potential if he really applies himself.
- 11. Rod Cahow Open the lanes up to the right and Mr. Cahow knocks down more pins than anyone.
- 12. Brian Dematte A solid game with a

solid future if he wants it.

- 13. Bill Kaelin Always around the cash spot. If he could bowl more, he would have more publicity. Really "gets all of it."
- 14. Larry O'Neill Still, after all these years, plays the game very, very well.
- **15. Russell Rose** Doesn't throw the "big ball," just big scores.
- 16. Mike Hahn In his prime, this future Hall of Famer was the premier player for the \$\$\$.
- 17. Wilson Rowe Still, after all these years, one of the best.
- **18.** Greg Wilson Another quiet winner and casher. Say it isn't so, Greg. You have not retired, have you?
- **19. John Tragert** When will the *real* John Tragert emerge?
- **20.** Jim Einhorn When the "left" is favored, Jim is always there.
- 21. Russ Sawyers Quietly goes around and cashes in most tournaments. He has quietly won as well.
- 22. Kendra Cameron She is proving she can compete successfully with the men. Outstanding cash record. If she develops a strong analytical mind for the game, she will become one of the best woman players in the world.
- 23. Lewis Twine Bowl, Lewis, bowl. Let the other players get to know who you are and how good you are.
- 24. Ken Szymanski Impressed me at a recent Syd Jones scratch tournament.
- **25.** Jim Robinette Are you still playing, Jim? Former No. 1-ranked bowler has a great "feel" for the game.
- **26.** Bobby Hall Another "old timer" who doesn't look pretty but knocks them down for the \$\$\$. Should be a Hall of Famer.
- **27.** Ron Steele A very underrated/underrecognized bowler who knows the color of bowling is green.
- **28.** Magic Gray Former PBA eastern region player of the year is always a threat in any tournament.
- **29.** Dave Hart Solid player who, when he plays, can hold his own with most players.
- **30.** Nick Serino Long-time Maryland bowler who can play. Should "cross the bridge" more often.
- 31. Ricky Wallace With some maturity and discipline, Larry's son will be part of cream

that rises to the top.

- **32.** Todd Larson Has graduated from handicap wins to scratch tournament cashes. If he overcomes a couple of flaws, Todd has top bowler potential.
- **33. Brad Tolson** Solid game. Always a threat to cash.
- **34.** Chuck Gadbois A senior player who is solid. Plays very well when he plays.
- **35.** Chuck Gannon "Mr. Alternate." Always a threat to cash because of his skill development and intensity. A *great* clutch player.
- **36.** Jerry Francomano This "master technician" and Hall of Famer doesn't bowl too often—he is always running the tournament for the bowlers.
- **37.** Jane Timmons Hall of Famer who should compete against the men more often. The result would be a lot of embarrassed male egos.
- **38.** Gary Harris A talented lefty who's starting to play the game more often.
- **39.** Doug Knoth Give him room left and Doug knocks them down. The talent is there, but is the discipline to learn to play the game to achieve a higher skill level? Needs to go beyond leagues/tournaments that have overly-easy lane conditions.
- **40.** Roger Painter A very fine player who should play more often. Solid game.
- **41. Graham Aylor** "Cracker": Leave Shirley for a weekend and come play again. This former record-holder has the ball to bowl with anyone.
- **42.** Mark Glover Hasn't done much "serious" bowling of late, but when and if he comes back, this six-time PBA regional champion is a threat in any tournament with a short oil pattern.
- **43.** Jack Bogan Learning and appreciating what it is to be a player. Has potential.
- **44.** Jim Troutman A solid player who has always been around the cash spot.
- 45. Jim Wolfe NCABA's "Mr. Revs."
- **46.** Allan Kitaguchi An "all or nothing" player. When this lefty is "on," he is really tough. Will play for the \$\$\$.
- 47. Charles Velasquez The Navy keeps this NCABA record-holder (868 series) a mystery to other players. Needs to find a backer so we can see how good be can become.
- **48. Brian Donati** With room right, Brian can play with anyone.
- **49.** Ken Shaw Bowling's Mickey Mantle. Only bowler I know who has 300s and 800s from both the left and right sides. This association's and one of the world's best "switch hitters."
- **50.** Greg Goetz I had to keep the final spot open for him just in case he unretires.
- 51. Gary Parsons Hey, it's my list!

- J.C. Arbogast When "on," J.C. can knock them down. Talent is there-is the desire and dedication?
- Ron Asbury Good bowler who seemingly always has been around and doing a fine job.
- Connie Bailey Scott's dad.
- Scott Bailey Connie's son.
- Bob Bean Very fine "down and in" player. Solid.
- Pat Blackmore "Mr. Dedication."
- Hersel Bowen Can play the game for the \$\$\$. An underrecognized player.
- Garry Breeden Over the years, always a good league bowler.

- Eric Burden A much better player than he gives himself credit for.

- Bill Davis Future Hall of Famer who still plays the game extremely well. An underrecognized "forgotten" player who shouldn't be.
- David Ferguson One of the area's finest instructors on an advanced level. Quietly becoming a top player.
- Damon Fisher Collegiate who's always near the top at tournaments.
- Al Franceschetti If I could get Al to take a confidence pill, he would be one of the best.
- Frank Gallo Jr. A good, solid player who does his fair share of cashing.
- John Green Great talent. Come out of retirement.

- Chip Hamilton Not textbook but can knock them down.
- Joanne Harris Top woman player who can play.
- Steve Harter Good teacher, good ball driller, good player. Should play more than he does - give those thousands a chance to cheer.
- Barry Hartman A developing college player who will surprise some people after graduation.
- Joey Havens A talented "young lion" who, with proper development, can create some waves in this game.
- Steve Hill If he ever gets serious again, this big man can knock down some serious pins.
- Bob Hilliard A fine Manassas player who should travel north more often.
- Phil Hiob "Old school" stroker. A fine teacher and player.
- Preston Hollis Solid credentials. Come out and play more often.

- Eric Michael Another fine bowler who got off the bowling train. (See Mike Whorton.)
- June Miller She should compete with the men and see how good she could be.
- Cal Moore Good bowler who should bowl scratch events more often to see how good he really
- John Moore Has a lot of potential. Should play the game instead of playing during the game.

- Berlin Myers She can play period.
- Debbie Myers With coming maturity, Berlin's daughter may become really, really good.
- Nick Newman A senior who should have "thousands" cheering him.
- Roxy Nicholson Larry O'Neill's stepdaughter is quietly becoming very good.
- Howard Parker Will play for the \$\$\$. Could become really good after correcting his balance problem.
- John Parks Talent is there is the desire to learn and apply himself?
- John Perry Solid game, solid player.
- Lisa Rand Good, solid "outside" player.
