And number twelve!

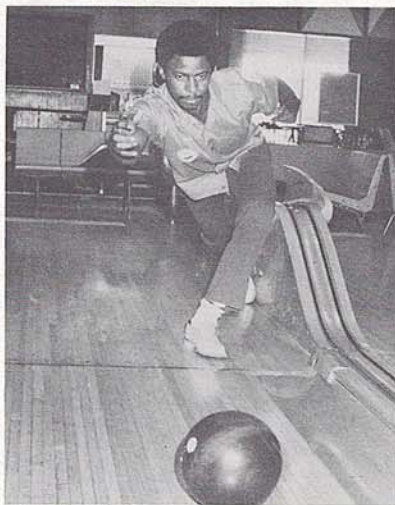
So, Paul Anderson carved himself a niche in the ABC record books as only the second time ever that a perfect game has been rolled on two pairs of lanes.
